Mastering A New Technique

Mr. Hallstrom’s Photography class spent the last week learning about the rule of thirds and applying it in their own photographs. They started the unit out by doing drawings as examples before moving on to shoot their photos and apply this dynamic.

Students were given several days in class to

take and edit their photographs. They used their new knowledge of the rule of thirds to divide their pictures up into nine subsections before deciding which of the four side-points would be best to keep the focus of their picture on. The point of the assignment was to photograph objects and have the viewer’s eye to be drawn to a spot that *wasn’t the center of the picture. This way, the photographers were shooting more dy-*

amic shots that keep a viewer’s eyes moving across the picture rather than immediately moving on.

The rule of thirds is one of the most well-known photography techniques. It states that a photograph is the most visually pleasing when the focus of it is along imaginary horizontal and vertical lines that divide the photo into thirds. It is a mathematical rule being applied to an artistic field, and it works

wonders in capturing a viewer’s attention for longer.

The photos were viewed by the class on Thursday, where everybody piled into the art room’s computer lab to watch their classmates demonstrate how they incorporated the rule of thirds into their photography. It was an interesting project that gave many students a new technique to master for their future work.
